## Town Votes To Continue Rent Control

By a vote of 1923 to 1146 the voters of Andover decided Tuesday that a substantial shortage of housing exists here which requires the continuance of federal rent control until Sept. 30 next year.

This controversial referendum question was on the second ballot presented to the voters at the state primaries and in the total of 3296 votes cast on it the "Yes" vote won over "No" in every precinct of the town.

### 3317 Ballots Cast Here In Primaries

Interest in the state primary contests and the much debated question of rent control brought 3317 of the town's 7419 registered voters to the polls Tuesday. This is a turnout of 44.7 percent of the vote.

There were 2564 Republican and 753 Democratic votes. On rent control 3296 ballots were cast. In the 1950 state primaries there were 1984 Republican and 543 Democratic votes, a total of 2527.

There were several write-in votes Tuesday. A. J. Rindazzo of Lawrence received 10 votes for the Democratic nomination for representative, and G. Hudson Driver of Lawrence, present register of deeds who was unopposed for re-nomination on the Republican ticket, received two Democratic votes.

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Representatives in the General Court engaged at Tuesday's primaries in contests for re-nomination from the Fifth Essex district, of which Andover is a part, were successful despite statewide rumbles of discontent on the part of voters following the dispute over pension grabs.

J. Everett Collins of Summer st., Frank S. Giles Jr. of Methuen and William Longworth of Methuen the three incumbents, won the Republican nominations in a field of five. Joseph E. O'Brien of Whittier st., and James W. Robertson of Lawrence were the other contestants.

As usual Andover gave the three present legislators a substantial vote, Collins getting 1937, Giles 1717, and Longworth 1687. O'Brien, making his first appearance in a political contest received 922 votes in his initial venture into the field.

On the Democratic ticket two local candidates were successful in winning nominations. Joseph A. Horan of Avon st., led the field in this contest with a total of 2766

**Eight To Pay Tax On Television Sets**

About eight Andover residents will pay a tax on their television sets this year, it was estimated by Roy E. Hardy, chairman of the board of selectmen.

As of this year, the law allows a \$5,000 exemption on household furnishings and personal effects. Previously the exemption was allowed only on such possessions in excess of \$1,000. With the advent of the new legislation, most Andover residents are exempted out of this tax class.

However, this exemption does not apply unless a return of household furnishings and personal effects estimates are made to the town assessors on or before January 31 of each year.

And here's the rub: assessors have no authority to enter a home unless asked by the proprietor to ascertain the estimated value of such possessions. If an abatement is sought on the tax amount imposed by the assessors, then the assessors have the right to enter and estimate the value.

### Prison Sentence For Local Break

A Methuen couple arrested in connection with a break last June at the Howard Johnson restaurant on South Main street, was arraigned in superior court at Lawrence Monday.

After he entered a plea of guilty, John F. Hart, 30, was sentenced to state prison for not less than four years or not more than six years to be served concurrently on charges of breaking and entering and larceny in the nighttime and having burglarious tools in his

possession. A charge of carrying a revolver without a permit was filed.

Zelma O. Hart, 50, his wife, had charges of breaking and entering and larceny in the nighttime and possession of burglarious tools filed so that she may return to California to live with her son and get the medical attention she needs for cancer.

Officer William F. Tammany testified that he and Officer Richard Caldwell were making a check at the restaurant about 1.50 a.m. June 25 when they saw a car parked near the building and a man running away. As they approached, the parked car started away. They chased the car and found Mrs. Hart in it.

A call was put in for additional help. State police and other officers responded and after a search Hart was found about 5 a.m. hiding in the woods. Entrance to the building had been gained by breaking the rear door and a safe that had been removed, was found intact on the rear steps.

Dist. Atty. Hugh A. Cregg, who prosecuted, recommended filing charges against the woman so that she could get medical treatment.

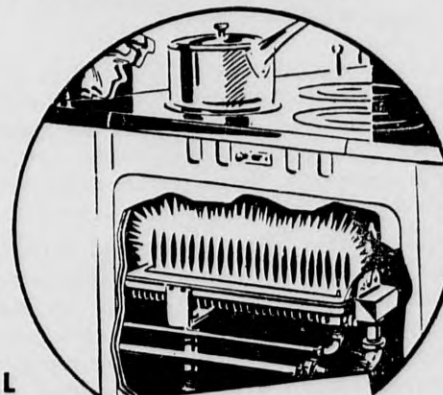

### INFLAMED GUMS-

Each tooth is surrounded by a collar of gingival tissue which, in the healthy mouths of children and young adults, is firm and pink and fits snugly. **Social Security Checks Going Up**

Social security checks mailed Sept. 3 to about 8,000 old age and survivors insurance beneficiaries in the Lawrence field office area were the last under the old rates of payment, according to Miss Vose, manager of the Lawrence social security office. Payments due to the same people early in October will amount to about \$310,000.

As a result of changes made in the social security law in July, nearly everyone receiving old-age and survivors insurance benefits will get higher payments. Most retired workers will receive increases ranging from \$5 to \$8.60. Increases for dependents and survivors will be less than those for retired workers. In most cases, these increases will be about \$2 to \$5.

"For example, she says, 'a retired insured worker whose August payment mailed this week is \$40, based on earnings received since 1936, will get a September payment of \$45; a worker who got \$68.50 in the current check will get \$77.10 the first week in October.'"

It will not be necessary for persons now getting old-age and survivors insurance payments to call or come to the Lawrence social security office to get the increases. The checks they will receive early in October will automatically carry the increased amounts.

**Veterans May Pay VA For Insurance**

Veterans now may make their checks or money orders for government life insurance premiums payable to "Veterans Administration", VA announced today.

Heretofore, checks and money orders had to be made payable to "The Treasurer of the United States". As a result, many premium payments were sent to the treasury department rather than to the VA district or central office handling the insurance account.

Veterans are advised by the VA not to send cash through the mails but to use checks or postal money orders. Cancelled checks or money order stubs will serve as premium receipts.

From now on there will be no official receipt returned to the insured each month.

Returning veterans of the Korean campaign are reminded that they must apply for the contin-

uance of the gratuitous national service life insurance, issued while in service at no cost, within 90 days after discharge.

Ballardvale, a new one-unit school building in the Carmel woods section, and the future growth and development of the town especially in the West Andover section.

The subject was brought up by Supt. Kenneth L. Sherman who in view of the tremendous growth of the school population, which is now far ahead of the projected population in the survey made a few years ago, suggested that the committee ask for a new building committee and the sum of \$1500 to be used at its disposal to make a study of the problem and present plans to provide for the situation.

Figures were presented to show that the school attendance now at 2045 would soon be about 2400 and in about 10 years time the senior and junior high schools with a present total of 720 would be in the vicinity of 1500.

Headmaster Harold Howe II spoke on this subject and said the present senior and junior high school buildings were now being operated at the capacity of their efficiency and soon would have about 800 pupils.

It was brought out that the present sixth grade, which will enter the junior high school next year, will be the last of the small classes and that afterward the classes entering junior high would be very much larger.

All members were present when the minutes of the last meeting, that of June 3, were read by Secretary Doherty and approved.

It was voted to send a letter of appreciation to the janitors for their effective work in getting the

two new buildings ready for the opening day.

When Supt. Sherman reported that a new janitor would be needed at the Central school Nov. 15 for the midnight to morning shift the committee voted to have him hire a janitor for this shift.

On motion of Mr. Doherty seconded by Miss Anna M. Greeley it was voted to elect Dr. Frank E. Himmer as school dentist for the period of one year. He succeeds the late Dr. Malcolm B. McTernan, a former member of the school board.

It was announced that Sunday, Oct. 5 was set as the date for open house at the new Central school.

Announcement of a reading conference at Poland Springs, Me., Oct. 2, 3 and 4 was also made. Supt. Sherman, Miss Miriam Hopkins, remedial reading teacher, and Miss Luella Dunning of the Panchard English department plan to go.

Salary schedules were discussed but no action taken. The next meeting will be Oct. 7.

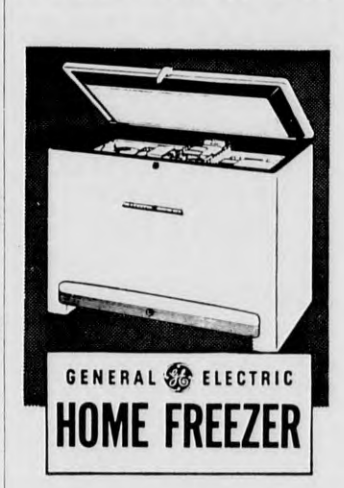

II. Combining the facilities of the 50-year old Borden gymnasium with the new structure, the Memorial gym will be fully staffed and equipped to furnish the Andover student body with the best in athletics and physical education. Dedication of this building is scheduled for March 1953.

Fred H. Harrison, 34, a native of Lawrence and an Andover alumnus is among the seven new faculty members. He will be an instructor with coaching assignments in baseball, hockey and football. Harrison is one of Andover's all-time athletic greats, including three straight pitching triumphs over arch-rival Exeter, and he later starred in all three sports at Yale. After service in the 13th Armored division in World War II he joined the faculty of the Berkshire school where he was for six years instructor in English and director of athletics.

William F. Graham, 25, a native of Cambridge who was educated at Malden high and then the University of Michigan, will teach mathematics. A World War II navy veteran, Graham has taught at the Browne & Nichols school for the past three years.

John C. McClement, 32, a native of New York City, attended Westminster school before Yale, from which he received an A.B. degree in 1942. McClement was also with the army in Europe in World War II, and then joined the staff of Kiski school, Saltsburg, Pa. In 1952 he received a master of education degree from the University of Pittsburgh. At Andover he will instruct in mathematics.

Joshua L. Miner III is one of two Exeter alumni joining the Andover faculty this year. After graduation from Exeter and later Princeton, he served in the field artillery during the war. Upon release from the service, he taught at the Hun school, Princeton, N.J. where he was also director of athletics. During the past year he has taught in Scotland at the Gordons-toun school. Miner will work with the athletic department and will teach science.

Jaime P. Salinas, 27, joins the Spanish department. Born in Algeria, Salinas was schooled in

America, and was graduated from Johns Hopkins university in 1951. He has had teaching experience with the Berlitz school and at Middlebury college. During World II he served in the American Field service, attached to the First French army.

San Van K. Willson, 24, a native of Rutland, Vt., graduated from Exeter and then Harvard. He has served in the army, and during recent summers he has been with the theatre guild and later music director at Ogontz camp. At Andover he will teach English.

Raymond A. Wolff Jr., 27, was born in New Kensington, Pa. and attended high school there. Upon graduation from Los Angeles City college he studied at the Oberlin (Ohio) conservatory of music. A veteran of three years' service

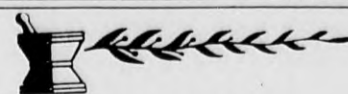
with the army, he will instruct in music at Andover.

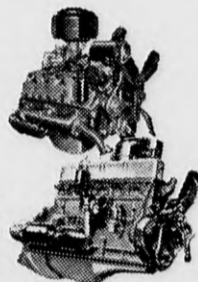
