



Eight To Pay Tax On Television Sets

About eight Andover residents will pay a tax on their television sets this year, it was estimated by Roy E. Hardy, chairman of the board of selectmen.

As of this year, the law allows a \$5,000 exemption on household furnishings and personal effects. Pre-viously the exemption was allowed only on such possessions in ex-cess of \$1,000. With the advent of the new legislation, most Andover residents are exempted out of this tax class.

However, this exemption does not apply unless a return of household furnishings and personal effects estimates are made to the town assessors on or before January 31 of each year. And here's the rub: assessors

have no authority to enter a home unless asked by the proprietor to ascertain the estimated value of such possessions. If an abatement is sought on the tax amount im-posed by the assessors, then the assessors have the right to enter and estimate the value.

"The price of liberty is eternal vigilance". That was true in the infant stages of this constitutional government. It is even more true today in a nation which has expanded and prospered far beyond the fondest hopes of its founders. Not only must America be vigilant against the threat of foreign attack, but it must be equally watchful against decay from within. Our armed forces have always risen to the occasion and liquidated those who challenged our military might. America's "home-front" troops have left much to be wanted.

Mr. and Mrs. Citizen, you are the "home-front" troops. You have the mightiest weapon at your disposal ever conceived. The atom bomb is but a toy in comparison to it. Political office holders are only as good as the standards which are demanded by those who elect them.

Let's bury the "tear bag". Let's assume a good part of the blame ourselves, Mr. and Mrs. Citizen, for the unsavory conditions at state and national level. The present deplorable situation has been made possible, largely, because you were absent from the roll call of public interest.

Government (local, state and national) is big business. You are the owners and operators of this business. If it fails, do not blame the men who are employed by you to work at it's operation, alone. Blame yourself for having been a poor employer, who managed affairs in a "Let-George-Do-lt" attitude.

But never forget, that if this business of government fails (American Democratic government) all other private businesses will change ownership also and people, who now have no time for political matters, will discover that politics and business have an important common denominator.

Each tooth is surrounded by a collar of gingival tissue which, in the healthy mouths of children and young adults, is firm and pink and fits snugly. With middle age, however, the tissue usually draws back. In these spaces, food particles and tartar can lodge and eventually irritate the gums so that they become inflamed and bleed easily. This condition is known as gingivitis. It can occur even in young people if the tartar constantly forming on the teeth be-comes so heavy at the gum line as to irritate the tissue. Usually the inflammation quickly disappears once the dentist removes the source of irritation.



Social Security Checks Going Up

Social security checks mailed Sept. 3 to about 8,000 old age and survivors insurance beneficiaries in the Lawrence field office area were the last under the old rates of payment, according to Miss Vose, manager of the Lawrence social security office. Payments due to the same people early in October will amount to about \$310,000.

As a result of changes made in the social security law in July, nearly everyone receiving old-age and survivors insurance benefits will get higher payments. Most retired workers will receive in-creases ranging from \$5 to \$8.60. Increases for dependents and sur-vivors will be less than those for retired workers. In most cases, these increases will be about \$2

to \$5. "For example, she says, "a retired insured worker whose August payment mailed this week August payment maned this week is \$40, based on earnings received since 1936, will get a September payment of \$45; a worker who got \$68.50 in the current check will get \$77.10 the first week in Octo-ber."

It will not be necessary for persons now getting old-age and survivors insurance payments to call or come to the Lawrence social security office to get the in-creases. The checks they will re-ceive early in October will auto-matically carry the increased amounts.

VA For Insurance

Veterans now may make their checks or money orders for govern-ment life insurance premiums pay-able to "Veterans Administration", VA announced today.

Heretofore, checks and money orders had to be made payable to "The Treasurer of the United States". As a result, many premium payments were sent to the treasury department rather than to the VA district or central office handling the insurance account. Veterans are advised by the VA not to send cash through the mails but to use checks or postal money orders. Cancelled checks or money order stubs will serve as premium receipts.
